Caring Social Justice

In IB PYP, being Caring means we show empathy, compassion, and respect. We have a commitment to service, and we act to make a positive difference in the lives of others and in the world around us. Being Caring may spring from new learning and result in Action in the form of Social Justice-the view that everyone deserves to enjoy the same economic, political, and social rights, regardless of race, socioeconomic status, gender, or other characteristics. As someone who Cares about Social Justice you may want to volunteer with an organization that shares your interests and supports the causes about which you care; participate in a virtual social justice rally or event; send letters and emails to local and global officials to communicate your concerns about issues; or organize your own group or virtual rally for social justice issues that are important to you!

Talk with your family about what values your family holds and explore issues and topics that align with these values. Then do some research together to see how you can bring awareness to that issue or participate with others as a family that Cares about Social Justice!

What Can Kids Do to Promote Peace?

We all wish we lived in a world where children weren't exposed to hate and violence, but we don't have to accept that the world often is not a peaceful place. Instead, we can help our children learn to show small gestures of peace that can add up to a big difference in our family, school, and community.

Random Acts

When we teach children to show gratitude and love, we are also teaching them to make every effort to live harmoniously with others.

- Teach children to perform random acts of kindness (say nice things to siblings, write notes to teachers and grandparents).
- Once children are comfortable performing acts of kindness toward people they know, challenge them to think about strangers, too.

Stand Up

- Talk to your children how sometimes children can be mean to each other.
- If children see a friend or classmate being picked on, they can act peacefully by standing up for the victim or by telling an adult who can help.

Help Those in Need

- Help children get involved in the community.
- According to Nathan Otto and Amber Lupton, authors of "Give Peace A Deadline," when humans work together toward a common goal, they're more likely to enjoy it, and make a difference in their community.

Teach Conflict Resolution

- Helping children learn how to solve their own problems is an effective way to promote peace because it teaches them how to function in the real world and how to compromise to retain relationships.
- Role-play with children so they can practice using appropriate words and learn acceptable ways to treat others.
